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# 1. Part 1 News & Updates

#### 1.1. Climate Action

#### 1.1.1 Climate Action Plan

Cork County Council's Climate Action Plan 2024-2029 was published on the 28<sup>th</sup> of February and a copy of the Plan and associated environmental reports are available for public inspection at <a href="https://www.corkcoco.ie">www.corkcoco.ie</a>. Physical copies of the Climate Action Plan in English and Irish are available in Cork County Council's Public Libraries during opening hours. The next phase of the plan i.e. the implementation of individual climate actions has now commenced.

### 1.1.2 Community Climate Action Programme (CCAP)

The Community Climate Action Programme (CCAP) provides eligible community groups with targeted funding to deliver local climate action projects and is administered through a competitive application process. The first call for applications in Cork County closed on Wednesday 6th March 2024, with a total of 36 eligible applications received. The evaluation of applications received has commenced and a portfolio of recommended projects for approval will be submitted to the Department of the Environment, Climate and Communications (DECC) at the start of May 2024. DECC have ultimate responsibility for project approval, and it is expected that successful applicants will be notified in Q3 2024 (as per the timelines provided by DECC). The following is a breakdown of applications received by project size.

### 1.2. Waste & Litter

### 1.2.1 Publication of National Waste Management Plan for a Circular Economy.

The country's first National Waste Management Plan for a Circular Economy launched on 1<sup>st</sup> March 2024 provides a new framework for the prevention and management of waste from 2024 to 2030.

The plan outlines a roadmap to a more circular economy, including increased waste prevention, more recycling, and improved reuse and repair practices.

#### 1.2.2 Deposit Return Scheme

Councillors will be aware that the Deposit Return Scheme (DRS) is now live since 1 February 2024. When you buy a drink in a plastic bottle, aluminium or steel can that feature the Re-turn logo, you pay a small deposit in addition to the price of the drink. When you return your empty and undamaged drink container to participating shops and supermarkets, you get your deposit back in full.

Issues have been raised with us by Councillors and others about "in scope" containers that do not have the Re-turn logo and accordingly we sought clarification from the **Re-turn** the administrators of the scheme.

Starting 1 February 2024, retailers have a 4-month transition period during which they can sell both new drinks containers with the Re-turn logo and older drinks containers that do not feature the logo, but whose barcode has been registered by the manufacturer/distributor under the scheme. Thus, during the transition period, drinks containers can incur a deposit in two ways:



- By having the Re-turn logo with a registered barcode
- By having a barcode that is registered as part of the scheme without the Re-turn logo.

Therefore, it is possible that, during the transition period, consumers may be charged a deposit for some containers that do not have the Re-turn logo. When the old stock has been sold, all new stock will have the Re-turn logo. All containers that have international barcodes registered with the scheme will have the deposit repaid when returned to an RVM(Reverse Vending Machine), even if they don't have the Re-turn logo.

During the transition period, there will also be old drink containers without a logo and with a barcode that has not registered with the scheme; these drinks containers will not incur a deposit charge.

From June 1, all drinks containers included in the scheme will feature the Re-turn logo and barcode. If a consumer is in any doubt about whether their container is eligible for a refund on a deposit, they can visit <a href="https://re-turn.ie/consumer/#barcodeChecker">https://re-turn.ie/consumer/#barcodeChecker</a> to verify.


#### 1.2.3 Use of CCTV and Mobile Recording Devices (MRDs)

The Circular Economy & Miscellaneous Provisions Act, 2022 was enacted to make provision for the use by a Local Authority of CCTV and mobile recording devices (MRDs) in certain circumstances and amends the Waste Management Act 1996 and the Litter Pollution Act 1997 accordingly.

Under the legislation the Local Government Management Agency (LGMA) were required to prepare and submit to the Minister for the Environment, Climate and Communications:

• Codes of Practices Pertaining to the Prevention, Detection and Prosecution of Waste and Litter Offences Using CCTV and Waste Offences using Mobile Recording Devices

The three Codes which were approved, and commencement orders signed on the 15<sup>th</sup> of February 2024, allow for the lawful use of CCTV and MRDs.

### 1.2.4 Launch of enhanced Waste Enforcement Regional Local Authorities (WERLA) 27th March 2004

The Local Government Sector has a newly enhanced specialist unit in place to deal with illegal waste activities across the state. **The Waste Enforcement Regional Lead Authorities (WERLAs)** based strategically throughout Ireland has been given additional funding by the Department of Environment, Climate and Communications (DECC) and will now be taking a front seat in enforcement matters dealing with household waste kerbside collectors, illegal waste activities and sites of concern.

### 1.3. Dog Control and Animal Welfare

#### 1.3.1 New Regulations increase Dog Control Fines

On 1st December last, new regulations came into force increasing fixed penalty fines under the Control of Dogs Act.

Under the new regulations, Dog Owners can receive on the spot fines of €300 for failing to keep their dog under effective control. Dog Wardens can also issue €300 fines to dog owners for failing to keep a dog muzzled or leashed in a public place where it is required.

#### 1.4.2 Globe Ireland Sustainable Urban Drainage (SUDs)-Nature Based Solutions Education Initiative

This January 2024, 40 Primary and Secondary schools across the country measured precipitation and investigated flood risk and opportunities for resilience in their school and school community.

Students additionally explored the implementation of Nature Based SUDS and completed site inventories and analyses to create 'Spongy School' solutions.

The Air & Wastewater Team of the Environment Directorate are assisting and providing technical guidance with school projects, including sending pH Test Strips to schools in County Cork.

The programme is managed by An Taisce, and the Environmental Protection Agency (EPA) and outcomes will be published in due course.

#### 1.4.3 Cloth Nappy Incentive Scheme

Cork County Council, in collaboration with Cork City Council, Cork University Maternity Hospital (CUMH) and Voice Ireland, launched the Cloth Nappy Incentive Scheme in December, to support parents in making a move from disposable nappies to reusable cloth nappies.

A baby uses between 4,000 and 4,500 nappies before potty training at roughly 2.5 years and the UNEP reported in 2021 that disposable nappies are one of the biggest contributors to plastic waste globally. The Cloth Nappy Incentive Scheme supports the use of reusable nappies among families who could not otherwise have considered trying them owing to the upfront costs in buying the nappies. The scheme was established by VOICE under funding provided by the Environmental Protection Agency for a pilot programme in Dublin which was very successful.

The scheme has been hugely popular since the launch in Cork. To date, 100 families in Cork County have been accepted on the scheme. Each family will be provided with a cloth nappy starter kit worth €100 and feedback on their experience will be collected over time.

### 1.4.4 WEEE National Campaign Launched

The recently launched WEEE National Campaign highlights the importance of recycling broken or unused appliances. The campaign is a collaboration between the Government, MyWaste.ie and the two national compliance schemes ERP Ireland and WEEE Ireland. Electrical items such as mobile phones, laptops, toasters, Christmas lights can all be recycled but people are either hoarding them or disposing of them incorrectly. According to WEEE Ireland chief executive Leo Donovan, "For every 10 new small electrical products sold in Ireland last year, only four are eventually coming back through the Irish-approved e-waste recycling system when they reach end of life."

The aim of the campaign is to encourage households to do a clear out of electrical items and recycle them for free at their nearest drop off point.

#### 1.4.6 Circular Economy Fund

Cork County Council launched a new **Circular Economy Fund** on Monday 8<sup>th</sup> April with the aim of empowering local action to drive a more circular economy. The fund aims to support communities to move away from the traditional linear 'take-make-use-dispose' model towards more circular living where resources are reused or recycled as much as possible, and the generation of waste is minimised.

The inaugural theme of what we hope will be an annual programme focuses on the reduction of single-use plastics, inviting **schools**, **community groups**, **sports clubs**, and **festivals** to submit proposals aimed at minimising single use plastics throughout their activities.

The fund builds on the successful engagement between Cork County Council and communities in recent years which has seen 35 water refill stations installed in schools and community buildings across Cork County as well as mobile hydration stations piloted at events.

With an increasing demand from the public to reduce single use plastics and a desire from communities to act, this fund will this year support the installation of temporary or permanent water refill stations in schools, community buildings, sports clubs and at festivals, reducing the environmental impacts of single use plastics.

#### 1.4.7 Webinar for Tourism Industry

The Cork Green Hubs Tourism Initiative is on a mission to support the tourism industry in their waste reduction initiatives through an online webinar. The 30-minute webinar takes place on Friday **12th April from 10am to 10.30am** where businesses from the industry can ask questions on how to segregate, label and monitor their waste. The panel includes Pauline McDonogh from the Southern Waste Management Region and Colm O'Brien from Wiser Bins.

For businesses that can't make the webinar and are unsure of where to start, we have provided the following tips to help them get started:

- Assess: Count the number and types of bins on your premises. Look at a sample of waste in some bins and see if waste is in the correct bin
- Contact your Waste Provider: Request data on your waste collections
- Plan: Engage with staff and identify how many bins are needed to maximise segregation
- **Download or order signage on My Waste.ie:** Label internal and external bins and consider using different colour bags for different waste streams.
- Measure: Collect and monitor waste data to track progress and highlight improvement
- **Highlight your efforts:** Display Green Hubs sticker on your premises.



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#### 1.4.8 Safe Cycle Hubs Initiative

Cork County Council's Environmental Awareness Office (EAO) were delighted to visit Holy Well Primary School, Carrigaline who were taking part in the Safe Cycle Hubs initiative which is run by CCC's Road Safety Officer, Caroline Casey. The project is supported by the EAO with a supply of bicycles sourced from two social enterprises in Cork, Cycle Sense and Sign and Cycle. The bicycles were old unused or broken bicycles which were repaired by the social enterprises and made available to the initiative.

Safe Cycle Hubs are continuing to evolve right across the county with 10 schools already taking part in the project. Since the initiative launched in 2021, 250 children have received the initial training. As part of the project, the teachers are also trained as "cycle right instructors" and further courses have been run in the schools by the teachers so approximately 500+ children have received the cycle training in total.

Schools who have taken part in the Safe Cycle Hub to date include:

- 1. CBS Primary School Mitchelstown
- 2. Bunscoil Na Toirbhirthe Mitchelstown
- 3. Kildorrery Primary School
- 4. Presentation Primary School Fermoy
- 5. Holy Well Primary School Carrigaline
- 6. Carrigaline Educate Together Primary School
- 7. Buttevant Primary School
- 8. Glantane Primary School (near Lombardstown)
- 9. Glenahulla Primary School (near Mitchelstown)
- 10. Castletownroche Primary School

The course is a 6-week course run in the school and some of the modules include saftey checks, bike checks, weather checks, raod safety, balance and co-ordination, signalling and shoulder checking etc. The children are really enjoying having cycle safety & skills included in their school week which will ultimately keep them safer on the road.

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### 1.5. National Broadband Plan (NBP)

### 1.5.1 Digital Connectivity Strategy Update

The January 2024 Digital Connectivity Strategy Update released by DECC reports:

The process of delivering fibre to all homes in the Intervention Area is progressing with momentum. While NBI is committed to delivering a cumulative target of 185,000 premises by the end of 2023 under the revised Contract targets, NBI passed over 205,600 premises up to the end of December 2023.

NBI believe they are now making up for delays encountered due to Covid restrictions and they will continue to seek to accelerate the rollout where possible. They expect to pass over 300,000 premises by the end of 2024.

To date over 69,100 full fibre connections have been made by NBI across all counties and demand remains very strong where fibre is available. Over 3,500 connections are being made each month.

#### 1.5.2 National Broadband Ireland



NBI advise of issuing news items direct to relevant Elected Representatives.

Network build is substantially complete in Carrigaline, Midleton, Youghal, Rathmore, Tallow, Templemartin as well as the Hare and Long Island DA's. Deployment in the, Clonakilty, Fermoy and Kanturk DA's is ongoing. Survey works in the Abbeyfeale, Dursey Island, Eyeries, Horse Island, Killavullen, Kinsale, Lauragh, Meelin, Mitchelstown and Skibbereen DA's is complete. Survey works are pending at Ballingeary, Bantry, Bere Island, Cape Clear, Sherkin Island, Carriganimmy, Charleville, Dunmanway, Grenagh, Kilcrohane and Schull. DA's

Approx. 77,000 premises across Cork County will ultimately benefit from access to high-speed broadband constructed under the National Broadband. Broadband connections can now be obtained at approx. 23,500 premises in the intervention area and network build a further 19,000 premises is ongoing.

#### 1.5.3 Broadband Connection Points

A total of 25 BCP's are now completed across the county and are operational. 23 of these facilities continue to operate as BCP's. Remote working is being accommodated at a number of BCP's.

The Council continues to support the Broadband Connection Points (BCPs) initiative and is co-funding the monthly broadband retail service costs at BCP's in association with Dept. Rural and Community Development. Many of the BCP's availed of Town and Village funding support to purchase furniture and fittings to enhance remote working opportunities.

Centres across the county hosting BCP sites will benefit to amounts of €320K following successful applications under the Community Centre Investment Fund grant scheme aimed at upgrading and development of community centre facilities which had become aged and dilapidated over time. The successful groups are:



Most of these projects funded under the Community Centre Investment Fund were completed by March 2024 deadline for drawdown of the approved funding. In the case of the remaining projects, extensions of time until July '24 were granted on foot of applications by the various project managers. These applications for extensions cited procurement and scarcity of resources as the reason for the extension applications.

### 1.6. Emergency Services

#### 1.6.1 Community Smoke Alarm Scheme

Cork County Fire Service will provide local Community Groups/Organisations with 10 year battery operated smoke alarms for distribution and installation in elderly and vulnerable resident's dwellings. These smoke alarms are only available to individuals through local Community Groups/Organisations. The importance of having a working smoke detector fitted cannot be over emphasised. Most deaths caused by house fires can be prevented if a working smoke alarm is installed.

Statistics show that 20% of households do not have a working smoke alarm. Working Smoke alarms can save lives!

#### 1.6.2 Controlled Burning

Cork County Council wishes to remind all land and property holders that it is illegal to cut, grub, burn or otherwise destroy, any vegetation growing on land not then cultivated, or in the course of cultivation, for agriculture or forestry between **1st March and 31st August** each year pursuant to the Wildlife Acts, 1976 and 2000.

The burning of waste is an illegal practice and is an offence under the Waste Management Act, 1996, as amended, the Air Pollution Act, 1987 and the Waste Management (Prohibition of Waste Disposal by Burning) (Amendment) Regulations, 2020.

The previous exemption under the Waste Management Regulations which allowed farmers to dispose of green waste generated by agricultural practices by burning ended on the 30<sup>th of</sup> November 2023.

Consequently, Farmers/Landowners are no longer permitted to burn agricultural waste and must instead apply the following waste hierarchy:

- Waste arisings are reduced in accordance with best agricultural practice.
- Waste is reused where practicable.
- Waste is recycled through shredding and used as compost or wood chippings.
- Waste is salvaged for use as fuel where practicable.

Uncontrolled fires pose a danger to wildlife, property, infrastructure, the environment, and potentially human life. They can be a significant and prolonged draw on Cork County Council Fire Service resources and may compromise their ability to respond to other incidents such as road traffic collisions or domestic fires.

Farmers carrying out limited controlled burning outside of the prohibited period of 1<sup>st</sup> March to 31<sup>st</sup> August must first notify the Fire Service by calling 999/112 to ensure that the Fire Service is not needlessly mobilised to the fire because of calls from concerned members of the public.

### 1.7. Emergency Planning

#### 1.7.1 Emergency Communications

Following a recommendation by the MEM Region South's Regional Steering Group, four SpaceX Starlink satellite internet systems units have been purchased for the region. These units will be installed in the strategically placed inter-agency emergency response vehicles located in County Cork, Cork City, County Kerry and the Inter-agency Emergency Management Office. The units will be available to the Principal Response Agencies (Local Authorities, HSE & An Garda Siochana) to enhance inter-agency emergency operational capabilities across the region.





#### 1.7.2 Severe Weather

Following the receipt of Severe Weather Warnings, Cork County Council's Severe Weather Assessment Team (SWAT) convene to assess the likely level of response the situation requires based on the severity of the weather forecast and weather warnings, tidal surge warnings from the OPW, local knowledge of particular catchments and coastal areas, antecedent conditions, flood alerts from the ESB and/or information from any Flood Warning Systems in place. The situation is continuously assessed by Cork County Council throughout the duration of the severe weather alert.

Cork County Council's SWAT convened via MS Teams on 12<sup>th</sup> March and 4<sup>th</sup> April 2024 in response to a Status Orange Weather warning issued by Met Eireann for County Cork.







Following updated HSE advise, sampling at nursing homes recommenced in 2022, subject to the incidence rate of Covid-19 at the time, as well as the agreement by management at individual nursing homes. In Q1 2023 priority was given to these nursing homes, as well as schools and creches.

Under the terms of our Service Level Agreement (SLA) with Irish Water, the Environment Directorate delivers an extensive sampling & testing programme in relation to public drinking water supplies. 



**Figure 1: IW Work Programme- Inspections** 




Figure 2: IW Work Programme - Samples



### 2.6. Energy Management

#### 2.6.1 SEAI

Public bodies are required under Statuary Instrument 426 of the European Union Energy Efficiency Regulations (2014) as amended to report their energy performance annually. The system by which public bodies report their energy consumption is through the Monitoring and Reporting (M&R) system, managed by the Sustainable Energy Authority of Ireland (SEAI).

Under the Climate Action Plan, Cork County Council had an energy efficiency improvement target of 50% from the baseline year of 2009 by 2030.

#### 2.6.2 Energy Efficiency Status 2030 (preliminary)




Figure 1 Cork County Council's energy efficiency performance glide path to 2030 from SEAI M&R

At the end of 2021, Cork County Council's energy efficiency was 25.3% better than baseline. The NEEAP target glide path presented in the current SEAI monitoring and reporting scorecard is shown in Figure 1.

The figures presented were published by the SEAI in their Annual Report 2020 on Public Sector Energy Efficiency Performance. The major findings are as follows:

- 2.8% worse than 2020
- 25.3% better than baseline (2009)
- 49.4% improvement required by 2030

Cork County Council's 2021 scorecard is expected to be published by SEAI in October 2023.

#### 2.6.5 ISO 50001

Cork County Councils Energy Management System (EnMS) is accredited to the ISO 50001 standard. Cork County Council is therefore compliant with SI 426, which is the statutory instrument that requires all large organisations to either have completed an organisational energy audit or have implemented an approved EnMS. An ISO 50001 surveillance audit was successfully completed on the 27<sup>th</sup> of April 2023.

#### 2.6.6 Significant Energy Users (SEU)

ISO 50001 is an organisational energy management system. A requirement of the ISO 50001 accreditation is that Cork County Council continuously monitors and reports on its SEU's. Cork County Council has four nr. Significant Energy Users (SEU). Cumulatively they account for more than 80% of all energy consumption. The 2022 percentage breakdown is provided below:

- Public Lighting (30%)
- Fleet (37%)
- County Hall campus (5%)
- Leisure Centres (7%)
  - Fermoy
  - Mallow
  - Dunmanway
- Other buildings (20%)

#### 2.6.7 Energy Efficiency Status

The Energy & Climate Change Section monitor the energy consumption of each SEU monthly using Energy Performance Indicators (EnPI). The EnPI for each Significant Energy User is described as follows:

#### County Hall has two EnPIs

- A formula called CUSUM predicts what energy should have been used based on past performance and is adjusted for weather conditions.
- kWh/m²/year
- Fleet
  - Is based on the average monthly litres/100km over the past 12 months.

#### • The Swimming Pools

- A formula called CUSUM predicts what energy should have been used based on past performance and is adjusted for weather conditions.
- **Public lighting** is calculated as the average wattage per lamp in the County. This energy performance indicator (EnPI) is reviewed annually.
