

TOURISM SPC - UPDATE ON THE DEVELOPMENT OF POLICY

Trails Policy – A Policy to maximise the economic benefit to the County.

Members of Full Council adopted the Trails Policy – A Policy to maximise the economic benefit to the County in December, 2015.

The aim of this policy is to make Cork an attractive destination for trails to be enjoyed by residents and domestic and international visitors, whilst maximising the economic benefit to the county. Through the promotion of trails, this policy aims to support rural regeneration, economic development and tourism in a sustainable manner.

Currently the Tourism Section are working with the groups responsible for the seven pilot trails identified in the policy and their immediate hinterlands using the template developed by the Tourism Section which has a common set of criteria. The criteria includes areas such as access, available services and potential for further economic activity. The seven pilot trails are as follows:

- Sheep's Head Way
- · Carrigaline/Crosshaven Walking Trail
- Avondhu Blackwater Way
- Clonakilty Area Cycling Experience
- Ballincollig Gunpowder Trails
- Ballyhoura Mountain Bikes Trails
- Slí Gaeltacht Mhuscraí

DRAFT MOTORHOME POLICY

It is intended that this draft policy will assist in the development of motorhome facilities in areas identified where there is a gap in the provision of such a facility. Consultation is ongoing and it is intended to have a further discussion on its content at the next SPC Meeting in July following which it will be tabled at Full Council.

LICENCING OF STREET FURNITURE POLICY

A Draft document on the Licencing of Street Furniture was presented to members of the Tourism SPC at its January, 2017 meeting. This was following a motion tabled for discussion at Full Council on 12th September, 2016 which was referred to the Tourism SPC for further consideration as follows:

"That this Council review the licencing fee for tables, chairs and street advertising structures outside business owner premises throughout the County and that a proper and fair system be implemented in the County"

Guidelines are currently being drafted to give advice on best practices in relation to the placing of street furniture. These draft guidelines will be brought before the Tourism SPC initially and to each Municipal District for consultation.

CORK COUNTY COUNCIL TOURISM STATEMENT OF STRATEGY & WORK PROGRAMME

Under the initiative of the County and City Management Association (CCMA) and the Local Government Management Association (LGMA), supported by the Department of Transport, Tourism and Sport (DTTAS), every Local Authority was required to prepare a Tourism Statement of Strategy and Work Programme for the period 2017 – 2022 using a common template which issued in December 2016, under the following headings:

- 1. National Policy.
- 2. Regional Action Plan for Jobs.
- 3. LECP Tourism Objectives.
- 4. Tourism Work Programme 2017 2022 Key Actions.
 - 4.1 Product / Experience Development.
 - 4.2 Festivals & Events.
 - 4.3 Marketing & Promotion.
- Regional collaboration and bespoke initiatives.

Prior to the completion of this Strategy & Work Programme, each Local Authority was requested to complete a detailed survey on Tourism to highlight the level of involvement and investment. The results of this survey formed the basis for an extensive report on Local Authorities contribution to Tourism prepared by the LGMA on behalf of the DTTAS.

The completed strategies were launched at the Local Government National Tourism Conference entitled 'Collaborate Locally to Compete Globally' on 29th and 30th March in Enniscorthy, Co. Wexford.

The conference highlighted the significant Irish success stories in tourism, shared key learnings, and highlighted the role of local authorities in facilitating this success. Local authorities invest in tourist attractions and infrastructure, maintain public realm and environmental assets such as beaches, interpret local heritage and support festivals, events and tourism promotion. This does not include the contribution by the sector in terms of expertise, project management, event management, promotion, health and safety and environmental management. The Irish tourism market is supported by very targeted and active participation by local government and in partnership with a number of government agencies, who work very positively on national, regional and local initiatives.

Importantly, local authorities play a pivotal collaborative role that supports local communities and businesses to harnesses the tourism potential of their areas. It is evident from the survey that local authorities mobilise a range of partners and stakeholders to deliver tourism initiatives. These include local community groups, businesses, local agencies and State agencies. This opens a range of funding opportunities from grant aid, bank loans, investments and sponsorship.

Cork County Council's Tourism Strategy Statement and Work Programme is aligned with the objectives of the Growing Tourism in Cork – A Collective Strategy, Local Economic and Community Plan (LECP), Regional Action Plans for Jobs and the Government's tourism policy, 'People, Place and Policy: Growing Tourism to 2025'.

GROWING TOURISM IN CORK – A COLLECTIVE STRATEGY

Following on from the launch of the strategy in January 2016, a Visit Cork Board was appointed who meet monthly. A Destination Manager and Sales & Marketing Manager were appointed in late 2016 to implement the 4 plans with 28 actions contained in the strategy. The Destination Manager reports directly into the Board each month.

A Local Authorities Tourism Strategy Steering Group was established with representatives from Cork County Council and Cork City Council. Its role is to work with Ms. Ursula Morrish, Destination Manager in implementing the actions where the Local Authorities are the Lead Partners and assisting in the implementation of the actions where the Local Authorities are the Key Partners.

The current update of the activity of Visit Cork is as follows:

BRAND MESSAGING AND VISUAL IDENTITY GUIDELINES

The creative agency Designworks have been appointed to design and deliver Brand Messaging and Visual Identity Guidelines. Handover of master artwork and guidelines is expected by the end of July 2017.

DIGITAL MARKETING

Visit Cork Website

Visit Cork is working with the Cork County Council and Cork City Council on the development of a website which will centralise all visitor information for Cork.

Social Media

Visit Cork is promoting Cork as a visitor destination through the following social media channels: Facebook @visitcork, Instagram @visitcork_ie and Twitter @visitcork_ie. A Facebook advertising campaign commenced in May promoting festivals to the International market. The first campaign was designed with input from the Cork Harbour Festival Marketing & Communications Officer, which is targeted at the UK market. A photography competition is due to be launched in May which will generate new content for promotional activities.

Nimbus Conference App

Visit Cork provided tourism content to Nimbus for a Nimbus Conference App. Tourism content was included in the Tech Summit 2017 App which took place at the Cork City Hall on May 4th, 2017.

Tourism Ireland Webinar

Visit Cork was invited by Tourism Ireland in Canada to take part in a webinar to an audience of 50 Canadian travel agents on May 17th. Visit Cork spoke on Cork 'itinerary ideas' for consumers.

Cork Tourism Training

A Cork specific tourism module is being designed with members of the Irish Hotel Federation, Cork Education and Training Board, Vintners Federation Ireland and Cork Institute of Technology all engaged in the design and implementation of the programme.

Participants will be given the skills to cross promote and influence visitors to Cork which will increase numbers and length of stay. The programme will be tested on May 31st in advance of the season. Keynote Speaker on the day will be Darina Allen, founder of Ballymaloe Cookery School. The pilot launch is scheduled for September 2017 and full launch and rolled out in February 2018.

Trade and Familiarisation Trips

Visit Cork are liaising with the Kerry Convention Bureau and Fáilte Ireland regarding familiarisation trips for TBEX conference delegates who will be in Killarney from 3rd – 5th October. Delegates will comprise of travel bloggers, travel writers and social media professionals. Familiarisation trips to Cork are expected to take place post conference.

Itineraries

15 itineraries have been completed for 3 market segments of varying length and location. Proofing of these itineraries is now in process and once complete will be sent to Fáilte Ireland for review.

OTHER TOURISM INITIATIVES BEING LED OR SUPPORTED BY CORK COUNTY COUNCIL

CORK IS THE GATEWAY TO BOTH THE WILD ATLANTIC WAY AND IRELAND'S ANCIENT EAST.

Cork is fortunate to be in the unique position of sitting within the Fáilte Ireland Experience Brands of Wild Atlantic Way and Ireland's Ancient East which represents a massive opportunity to capitalise on.

WILD ATLANTIC WAY

Cork County Council continues to work closely with Fáilte Ireland in the further development of the Wild Atlantic Way Brand. The installation of interpretative panels and photo points at 34 sites in Cork was completed by end of 2016 and the roll out of Irish Place Names at the Discovery Points will be completed shortly.

IRELAND ANCIENT EAST

As with the development of the Wild Atlantic Way product to date, Cork Co Council is working closely with Fáilte Ireland in the development of the brand and the roll out of required infrastructure. Interpretative panels have been erected in four locations in December, 2016 as follows:

- Jameson Whiskey Distillery Entrance, Midleton.
- Fota House.
- Camden Fort Meagher.
- Youghal, Courthouse location.

The Tourism Section has commenced supporting Fáilte Ireland in implementing Wild Atlantic Way and Ireland Ancient East Experience Development Plans to deliver a portfolio of new visitor experiences.

NORTH CORK

NORTH CORK HERITAGE TRAIL

The development of a Heritage Trail in North Cork is currently in the early stages of development in conjunction with the Heritage Unit, County Archaeologist and Fáilte Ireland using Ireland's Ancient East thematic areas. This will be used as a pilot for the consideration of the development of further Heritage Trails in Cork County.

ANNESGROVE GARDENS, CASTLETOWNROCHE

Annes Grove Estate in Castletownroche was donated to the State in December 2015. The demesne, gardens, parklands, house and outbuildings consist of 190 acres and represent one of the outstanding gardens of its type still remaining in Ireland. The Estate is now in the care

of the OPW and the gardens are currently undergoing extensive restoration works on a phased basis.

BUTTEVANT MEDIEVAL HERITAGE EXPERIENCE

This project will deliver a visitor experience and an international attraction, which connects all aspects of the unique and often hidden culture and heritage of Buttevant, a designated Walled Town for 700 years.

The project will include the development of a 1km Medieval Town Trail incorporating 6 National Monuments. Specific aspects of the project will include a riverside trail, raised platform/path, reconstruction of the Medieval town wall, planting, interpretive signage and the provision of parking. The area is easily accessible from the centre of the town via three access lanes. It will be wheelchair accessible.

NORTH CORK BLUEWAY FEASIBILITY STUDY

REDZ funding in the sum of €40,000 secured to undertake a North Cork Blueway Feasibility Assessment and Related Implementation Plan. This plan will include the necessary planning documentation, fully costed implementable recommendations facilitating safe, sustainable and increased access to the River Blackwater for water based activities; recommendations for related tourist focused recreation activities and supporting measures / products to promote the area and enhance visitor experience of any proposed facilities. A contractor has been appointed and initial meetings have taken place. Work will commence shortly.

SOUTH CORK

GREENWAYS

CORK HARBOUR GREENWAY

Permission was recently secured for the development of a 4.6km section of greenway between Glenbrook and Raffeen. When developed, this section of greenway will be a significant element in linking Glenbrook to Carrigaline and is an important step towards the objective of delivering a harbour-long greenway which will ultimately extend from Cork City to Cross2haven.

MIDLETON TO YOUGHAL GREENWAY

Proposals are also being progressed for a potential future greenway on the disused railway line between Midleton and Youghal. This project has the potential to build on the key tourism assets in both Midleton and Youghal, link the towns and villages along the way, attract people to visit the area and encourage visitors to stay longer with a knock-on effect for accommodation providers, shops and restaurants. This is in addition to the year-round benefit to the local community as a high quality recreational amenity.

YOUGHAL TO 2020

Youghal to 2020 is in its final draft stages and it is expected to be before the East Cork Municipal District members in July. Youghal to 2020 has a very clear focus. It

unequivocally seeks to make Youghal a better place that people want to live, work, visit and invest in. The plan comes at a time when Youghal is at a crossroads in its regeneration and it proposes ways in which our physical and non-physical heritage resources within the Town can be used as a catalyst in urban regeneration and tourism growth. Youghal to 2020 is a clear statement of our intention to re-invigorate the Town of Youghal, restore its vibrancy, promote and protect our heritage and safeguard its future for generations to come.

WEST CORK

SAM MAGUIRE STORY

The Sam Maguire Story, Dunmanway is at a very early stage of story research. Cork County Council is carrying out the work and the timescale for completion is Autumn 2017. The project is being funded under the Town & Village Renewal Scheme 2016.

MICHAEL COLLINS COUNTRY TRAIL

The aim of this trail is to highlight all the locations in West Cork associated with Michael Collins, with 6 routes proposed as follows:

Route 1: Clonakilty to Lissavaird to Sams Cross to Woodfield

Route 2: Clonakilty to Michael Collins Centre

Route 3: Clonakilty to Eniskeane to Beal na Blath to Crookstown

Route 4: Clonakilty to Bandon to Beal na Blath

Route 5: Stage Cross (On N22 at Crookstown) to Beal na Blath

Route 6: Murragh (On the R-586 between Enniskeane and Bandon) to Newcestown to

Beal na Blath.

The Michael Collins Trail has been mapped and all the junction signs have had a preliminary design prepared.

Currently to meet Traffic Infrastructure Ireland (TII) requirements the design of these signs must now be finalised. This will require help from external consultants experienced in traffic sign design for TII. Permission has been received from TII to utilise their Framework Agreement for Technical Services. It is hoped to set up a meeting with one of the consultants from the Framework in the next month to discuss the proposal with them.

Within Clonakilty Town there will be signage to the Michael Collins statue, Michael Collins House and the West Cork Regional Museum. At this stage there are approximately 110 signs required.

BEARA HORSE TRAIL

Phase 1 of the project, providing a bridleway from Castletownbere to Allihies and on to Urhan, has been completed utilising funding from the 2015 Rural Economic Development Zones (REDZ) scheme, matched with contributions from Cork County Council and Beara Tourism. This route allows for two days trekking on the Beara peninsula.

Phase II of the project, extending the trail to 5 days and covering the area on to Eyeries as well as additional loops close to Allihies and Castletownbere, has been successful in securing further REDZ funding under the 2016 scheme. Pending agreement on the phasing of works in line with an agreed timetable, this project is ready to commence construction. Cork County Council is again supporting the roll out of this project through match funding.

SUBMISSIONS TO THE FÁILTE IRELAND GRANTS SCHEME FOR LARGE TOURISM PROJECTS 2016 – 2020

In line with Fáilte Ireland's Tourism Investment Strategy 2016 - 2022, £65m will be made available over the period 2016 - 2020. The closing date for the initial call for funding applications was 22^{nd} August, 2016 with an outcome of these applications expected shortly.

Cork County Council submitted the following applications:

- Dursey Island Cable Car & Visitor Centres
- Kinsale Wild Atlantic Way Plaza on the Short Quay incorporating interpretation of the Battle of Kinsale & Lusitania Tragedy
- Upgrading of Streetscape Main St, Kinsale
- Spike Island Phase 2
- Buttevant Medieval Heritage Experience (1.6km trail) Medieval Town Trail
- Tourism Section provided assistance to Buttevant Community Council with the support of Avondhu Blackwater Partnership

MARKETING SUPPORTS

CRUISE TOURISM IN WEST CORK

Cork County Council continues to engage the services of Lorraine Grainger, Tourism Consultant for a two year period from February, 2016 to work on our behalf to encourage additional cruise liners to visit West Cork. A total of 6 cruise ships will visit Glengarriff and Kinsale in 2017.

WEST CORK ISLANDS

In 2017, Cork County Council has continued to financially contribute to the marketing and promotion of West Cork Islands including the costs associated with printing the West Cork Islands brochure and its distribution as well as its Spring Marketing Campaign.

A TASTER OF WEST CORK EXHIBITION

Financial support has been approved towards the costs associated with running an exhibition called "A Taster of West Cork" that will be organised by A Taste of West Cork Food Festival Committee, in the Exhibition area at the Arrivals Hall, in Cork International Airport during the months of August and September. This exhibition will be a 'shop window' for both the art and craft produced in West Cork and will show case the regions talented artists and craftspeople.

CORK HARBOUR ISLANDS

Financial support in the sum of €12,500 towards the marketing costs associated with promoting Cork Harbour Islands. This is a new marketing initiative established by likeminded tourism providers within the Cork harbour area in 2016. Their objective is to create a link between strong tourism brands and support tourism products within a defined geographical area.

SUPPORT TO CORK AIRPORT MARKETING

Cork County Council financially contributes through the Economic Development Fund to a €1m Co-operative marketing programme led by Tourism Ireland for the Cork Airport destination and airline offerings.

Collaborative meetings between Cork County Council, Cork Airport, Fáilte Ireland, Tourism Ireland, Cork City Council and Visit Cork were initiated in 2016 to agree marketing and new development of inbound air routes into Cork. These meetings are continuing into 2017.

CORK COUNTY COUNCIL HERITAGE MAPS

Cork County Council has produced 6 historic town maps for the following locations: Bandon, Kinsale, Skibbereen, Dunmanway, Charleville, Blarney. A historic town map for Bantry is currently in progress. The intention is to produce Heritage Maps for each town in Cork County.

FESTIVAL /EVENT SUPPORTS

Through the Economic Development Fund and General Tourism Budget, Cork County Council continues to be a significant financial contributor to large scale Festivals/Events on an annual basis recognising the significant economic benefits to an area which they bring. To date this year the following festival/events to the value of €241,250 have been funded:

REGIONAL COLLABORATION AND BESPOKE INITIATIVES

MUNSTER VALES

Munster Vales is a tourism destination of domestic and international significance established in 2014 spanning the Comeragh, Knockmealdown, Galtee, Ballyhoura and Nagles Mountain ranges. The Munster Vales proposition is to promote and develop the outstanding walking, cycling and heritage product as a regional brand linking the counties of Cork, Limerick, Tipperary and Waterford aligned with the Fáilte Ireland Brand, Ireland's Ancient East. Areas in North Cork within the Munster Vales area include Mitchelstown, Charleville, Buttevant, Mallow, Doneraile and Castletownroche.

LINKS WITH CHINA

Cork County Council has developed a relationship with the Jiangsu province in China. Our shared objective from this relationship is to exploit opportunities in the areas of Education, Culture, Heritage, Tourism, Scientific and Technological Innovation, Exchanges and the promotion of Economic Development opportunities for our mutual benefit. Amongst Cork County Councils objectives in developing the relationship is to raise awareness about the attractiveness of Cork as a location to work, live and visit and to promote Cork as a destination for foreign direct investment.

Promoting tourism to the Cork region is the first major project which Cork County Council has undertaken since commencement of the ties between the two regions. This project, focussed on cultural tourism, was designed to inform the Chinese tourist industry about Irish culture and Cork's tourism offering.

CORK CONVENTION BUREAU (CCB)

Cork Convention Bureau continue to secure conferences through the work of the Bureau, its ambassadors, members, and regional and national stakeholders which are of significant economic benefit to the region. CCB has been financially supported by a number of key stakeholders of which Cork County Council, Cork City Council and Fáilte Ireland are the main contributors.

To date in 2017, Fáilte Ireland and Cork Convention Bureau has a further €24m worth of international conferences in the pipeline for Cork, up to the year 2021. Already over 20 conferences worth a combined €12m are confirmed for Cork in 2017.

To build on its success as a MICE destination, Cork Convention Bureau are currently developing a new strategy for 2017 – 2018 to grow International delegate numbers thus adding to a greater economic impact.

International Congress and Convention Association Rankings for 2016 (ICCA)

In 2015 ICCA rankings, Cork was placed 335th worldwide, in 2016 we've moved to 186th place while in the European rankings we moved from 167th place to 98th. This is based on the number of approved conferences per city. This year we're sharing spots with cities such as Houston, Johannesburg, Leeds and Belfast.

TASTE CORK

Taste Cork provides an 'on the ground' link to food businesses which, over the coming years, will act as an effective tool for involving industry in local tourism activities and decision making. Taste Cork also serves the industry as an effective touch point for any individual wishing to communicate with the food sector in Cork, in order to explore collaborative ideas they might have for the region.

Taste Cork aims to continuously communicate national strategy at a local level and therefore engage frequently with Fáilte Ireland to ensure they are part of our food tourism activities and projects. The following is a sample of Taste Cork activity update for 2017:

- (i) Food Tourism Workshop, Longueville House, 22nd February 2017 Fáilte Ireland and Taste Cork held a networking workshop exploring the current approach to Food Tourism in the North Cork area and how collective collaboration can assist destinations in gaining a competitive advantage.
- (ii) Taste Cork held a food conference on 7th March 2017, *Brand Storytelling: The Foundation of Your Growth Strategy*. Fáilte Ireland spoke at the event to communicate how smaller food businesses can use the Ireland's Ancient East and the Wild Atlantic Way brands as marketing tools for their business, and work towards enhancing their food tourism identity and offering.
- (iii) Taste Cork is developing strong relationships with the Fáilte Ireland Food Champions based in Cork - Ruth Healy, URRU Bandon and Kevin Aherne, Sage restaurant, Midleton. Taste Cork aim to work with the Food Champions on their tourism projects over the coming years.
- (iv) Taste Cork Week, October 2016

 A new festival was launched in October 2016, Taste Cork Week. For this week, foodservice venues across Cork signed up to tell the story of Cork's produce, history & culture through dishes, menus and events. Over 40 venues participated in 2016, with over 30 events taking place.

INTERREG EUROPE PROJECT - DESTINATION SME, JANUARY, 2016 DECEMBER, 2020

Cork County Council is a partner in the Interreg Europe Project, Destination SME. The aim of this project is to improve SME competitiveness in the tourism sector by supporting the implementation of destination management policies. By sharing experiences, the project will identify and transfer good territorial policies developed by Managing Authorities and dedicated to the tourist destination management, with a strong focus on the involvement of the SME's in the local decision making process. The other partners involved in this initiative are as follows: Latvia, France, Finland, Slovenia, Italy & Malta.
