230001	Amanda Clarke	<p><b>Holy Wells of County Cork This project will be a book.</b></p> <p>A description of the project/initiative/event (circa 200 words) setting out the relevance of same and how it relates to the heritage of County Cork at the local level. Please note it is intended that this description will be used online for promotional purposes and all details, including date, venue and time, as applicable, must be as precise as possible</p> <p>It is also important to note that all projects must be in keeping with Covid-19 Public Health Guidance and applicants are also required to provide details of contingency plans in this regard, as appropriate:</p> <p>This book is the result of seven years of research into the 358 holy wells listed in the Archaeological Survey for County Cork. Concerned by how many seemed to be disappearing, both physically and from memory, I decided to see how they were faring.</p> <p>I began my quest in 2016 and have since visited around 330 wells. At each site I made notes, took photos and later researched the history and folklore concerning each well. This publication is the result of my endeavours which I believe is a unique and timely piece of research. The book is divided into topics such as cures, saints and pilgrimage and is written in an accessible style, richly illustrated with my own photos. I believe it will have a broad appeal as it covers all areas of the county and will be of interest to those fascinated with local history. 230002	American Pier Cobh association	<p><b><u>American Pier Cobh historical open day</u></b></p> <p>The association has compiled an extensive archive (see <a href="http://www.americanpier.com">www.americanpier.com</a>) of the importance of the American Navy and in particular the need for No 4 hospital in Whitepoint in Cobh. The hospital used what is now called the American pier to land sick servicemen from the US Navy fleet stationed in Cork Harbour. The pier which was also used as a local amenity has fallen into disrepair. An association was formed comprising of Local residents, boating societies, swimming groups and tidy towns to repair the pier (consultant's report on our website). We want to hold an event to coincide with Heritage Week explaining the historical importance of the pier and to promote awareness in the public as to its importance for future generations. 230004	Ballyvourney Shrine Committee (St Gobnait's Shrine Committee)	<p><b><u>St Gobnait's Relic: Replicating and Conserving a Living Tradition Project</u></b></p> <p>The carved medieval <b>wooden statue</b> of St Gobnait is of intrinsic local and national importance. Standing just 75.5cm x 18cm, the relic dates to the 13th century.</p> <p>As patron saint of the parish, St Gobnait's relic is displayed in the local church for public engagement on her feast day on the 11 February where it is venerated as part of the devotion to the saint. As part of this veneration, there is the 'taking of the measure', an intriguing ritual of measuring the statue with ribbons, which are kept as tokens ensuring good health for the remainder of the year.</p> <p>Adding weight to the importance of the relic is that the statue represents a direct link to the origins of Christianity in the parish, and indeed Ireland, which continues to the present day as an active devotion. The statue is one of just a handful (4 are known) of such wooden relics in the country, and it is therefore also of national importance as a significant archaeological object. It is kept in secure storage and under the care of the Parish and Shrine Committee in Ballyvourney, Co. Cork, who are a voluntary, non-profit group.</p>	Baile Bhuirne	Macroom	TBC	€2,750	2250

		<p>It is intended to have 2 replicas made of the statue, which will be put on permanent display in the local parish church, with interpretive signage. This will bring the story of the statue to local and visitor alike, all year round, and will serve to raise awareness of and promote the artefact, St Gobnait and the devotion to her. It will highlight the parish's rich heritage and will also inspire further research on this aspect of our ecclesiastical heritage. Having replicas in place will importantly help to relieve unnecessary handling of the statue itself, and will assist in its conservation and protection. In that regard, it is hoped to get a conservation assessment carried out to inform the future long-term preservation needs of the statue, in keeping with best practice. 230005	Bandon Library	<p><b><u>This project is a publication of a map physical &amp; digital.</u></b></p> <p>Cumann Seanchais na Banndan has presented Bandon with a large format map of the town of Bandon from the 1860s to ensure its preservation, and to make it available to the people of Bandon. It is the intention of Bandon Library to arrange for the digitisation, and reproduction of this map as a large scale wall display, to ensure that the local community, at every age, can view and enjoy this important historical artifact, free of charge at their local library.</p> <p>Bandon Library has received several requests from local historians to view the map, which reflects great community interest in this artifact.</p> <p>The map was originally donated to Cumann Seanchais na Banndan by Ms. Finola McDonnell and was restored by Trinity College Dublin in the early 1990s.</p> <p>The map is in six sections – each approx. A (0) size. Should this funding application prove successful, Bandon Library will contact Informa to carefully digitise the map sections and reproduce the map as a digital whole. The digital files will then be printed and installed on the walls of the Library's Community Meeting Room for general interest.</p> <p>The original map will be shipped to Cork County Council Library &amp; Arts Service's Local Studies Dept. and made part of its permanent map collection so that future researchers and local historians can avail of it, while ensuring its preservation in a more suitable archive environment.</p>	Bandon	Bandon-Kinsale	N/A	€1,980	1500

In 2022 Bandon Walled Town Committee produced <b>a book</b> on the history of the town from walls creation to their collapse. Produced in English, this simple booklet was aimed at children and families and those who would like to know the basics of local history and hopefully engage them with the heritage around them.</p> <p>Cognisant of the multi-diverse population in Bandon (with an estimated 1 in 5 inhabitants of Foreign National heritage) we would like to further engage with those living within our town and highlight the heritage that surrounds them.</p> <p>Building on this we would like to translate the booklet into 3 languages, Ukrainian, Polish and Portuguese and Irish (based on 3 traditional non-English speaking nationalities most widely spoken in Bandon and Ireland's native language. 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230008	Bill Power	<p><b>“The Blackwater – History and Images from the Irish Rhine”</b></p> <p>This is a unique 320-page collection of history and images from the Blackwater River, which is Ireland’s fourth longest river. The historical accounts begin at the source of the river in North, West Cork, near Ballydesmond and, like the river itself, travels across North Cork through the parishes of Millstreet, Kanturk, Lombardstown, Mallow, Killavullen, Castletownroche, Fermoy, and Kilworth, as far as the sea at Youghal. It incorporates some of the tributaries such as the Awbeg, which flows through Buttevant, Doneraile and Castletownroche, and the Funcheon which flows through Mitchelstown, Kildorrery and Glanworth.</p> <p>The book is richly illustrated by 240 photographs, old and modern, including approximately 40 aerial images of parts of the river not known to the general public.</p> <p>It contains 75,000 words. Topics include the building of Ballydesmond in the 1830s, Kanturk Castle, coal mining in the Dromagh Coalfields near Millstreet, the development of Buttevant, Mallow as seen by visitors to the town in the 19th and 20th century, and Killavullen’s relationship with Cognac, Edmund Burke, and Nano Nagle.</p> <p>Similarly, there are historical accounts of some of the landed estates and big houses along the river, as well as the development of the Blackwater canal in the 1700s, bridges, town building, the rise of Fermoy and Buttevant as military garrisons, and how the dating of Irish deer bones at Doneraile has transformed Irish archaeology.</p> <p>At Youghal, the book deals with such subjects as Sir Walter Raleigh, Youghal Carpets, Saint Mary’s Collegiate Church, witchcraft trials and public executions in the late 1790s. 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230016	County Cork Barn Owl Nest Box Project	<p style="text-align: center;"><b>County Cork Barn Owl Nest Box Project</b></p> <p>This project would seek to conserve natural heritage. The Barn Owl (<i>Tyto alba</i>) is a red listed species formerly common throughout Ireland. Significantly, the number of breeding pairs of this nocturnal raptor in Cork constitutes a substantial proportion of the total Irish population. Barn Owls face a number of threats, including a lack of available nesting sites.</p> <p>The aim of this proposal is to expand on the successful Heritage Grant applications of 2021 and 2022, when 50 nest boxes were erected in East Cork. A number of these boxes already have Barn Owls nesting in them. Our objective is to construct a further 80 Barn Owl nest boxes and erect them throughout the three Eastern Municipal Districts of County Cork.</p> <p>The project would liaison with Birdwatch Ireland's County Cork Barn Owl Distribution Survey (2023), utilising their findings (with permission) to erect boxes at locations that maximise their chance of uptake, particularly in areas where there is ample hunting habitat but limited nesting opportunities.</p> <p>Furthermore, the increased geographic coverage of nest boxes would greatly enhance the 2021 and 2022 East Cork work and more fully assist Barn Owl conservation in Cork County, with positive knock-on implications for the national population.</p> <p>A vast amount of experience, contacts and practical know-how garnered over the last two years would ensure a focused effort in project execution. All information would be shared with Birdwatch Ireland and the NBDC. Every nest box would be monitored each summer, under licence from the National Parks and Wildlife Service, to assess the uptake of nest boxes and to inform ongoing maintenance where necessary.</p> <p>Two short videos, one as Gaeilge and one in English, of the project in progress would be recorded and made available to Cork County Council.</p>	East Cork	East Cork	TBC	€3,000	1250
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230019	Derry & Sandra O'Donovan	<p><b><u>This project is to erect a lectern type interpretative sign with text and graphics in the area surrounding Togher Castle.</u></b></p> <p>Togher Castle is a significant example of a 16th / early 17th century architecture, a Tower House constructed by the Gleann na Chroim branch of the MacCarthy Clan- a sister/ cousin branch to those of Blarney Castle.</p> <p>Exhibiting architectural sophistication and innovation absent in other Tower Houses, it is directly relevant to the heritage of County Cork from many perspectives including archaeological, architectural, the county's colonial past, the diaspora and as a tourist attraction for ancestral MacCarthy lineage.</p> <p>Frequented, weekly if not daily by tourists, it is a pivotal part of a huge diaspora of MacCarthy's globally, evidenced by gatherings of 2013 and 2017, a large cohort of the MacCarthy DNA Project claim ancestry to Togher.</p> <p>It's the primary focus of the literary work of Daniel MacCarthy Glas, 19th century antiquarian, and historian who attempted to conserve the Castle in 1870s. Daniel, who was a founder of the Kilkenny Society (precursor to the Royal Society of Antiquaries of Ireland). His life's collection is housed in Cork City &amp; County Archives since 2017.</p> <p>It is imperative at this stage that a suitable informative sign be erected to enhance the historical experience for visitors to the Castle area and document the history of this once famous Clan Tower House.</p> <p>This sign will be a timeline documenting in text and graphics the key milestones of the history of the Castle, with images of its interior, suggested layout, its rise in prominence as a Clan MacCarthy Tower House and its consequential demise with the Flight of the Wild Geese, Elizabethan conquest and Cromwellian invasion and the efforts at conservation in the late 1870's.</p>	Dunmanway	West Cork	Heritage Week	€2,250	1500
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230022	Doug Lucey	<p>From Muskerry to Médous: in search of Justin MacCarthy, Lord Mountcashel. <b><u>This project will be a presentation.</u></b></p> <p>A talk/slideshow presentation by historian Doug Lucey at Independence Museum Kilmurry on Sunday 20 August 2023 at 8pm.</p> <p>Justin MacCarthy, son of Donough MacCarthy, Viscount Muskerry is a figure of local, national, and international importance. He was the first commander of the Irish brigade in the French Army of Louis XIV, a position he held until his death in 1694. Contemporary sources state that Justin was interred at Barèges in the French Pyrenees. Doug’s research suggests that his final place of rest may be elsewhere, at one of the most important pilgrimage sites in the Pyrenees prior to the French Revolution. This location will be revealed during the talk/slideshow presentation on 20 August. The story will focus on Justin’s Muskerry and Cork connections, involvement during the Williamite War, and on his military career in France, death, and poignant final wishes.</p>	Macroom	Macroom	20/08/2023	€350	150
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230023	Dr Ruth Carden on behalf of the Castlepook Cave Excavation Collaborative Team 2022	<p style="text-align: center;"><b><u>The Castlepook Cave Project</u></b></p> <p>Castlepook Cave is of geological and national importance. This complex contains multiple passageways on multiple levels and lie in the Awbeg Valley below the Ballyhoura Hills on a flat limestone plateau north of the Blackwater River in Co. Cork.</p> <p>The cave system was initially explored by Ussher (1881). It encompasses a complex of north-south running narrow galleries (1m in width) that open into larger chambers (c.10m in width). Ussher and his team apparently excavated much of the cave system of its sediment between 1904 and shortly before his death in 1914. The final report was written by Scharff et al. (1918) using Ussher's field notebook.</p> <p>The cave sediments yielded rich pre-Last Glacial Maximum and Late Glacial faunal remains, with this site being only one of two caves in Ireland to hold these temporal deposits; the other is Ballynamindra Cave, Co. Waterford (Carden et al., 2020; Jennings et al., in prep.).</p> <p>However, of the c. 34,000 bone remains excavated in the antiquarian excavation the National Museum of Ireland currently holds only 2-3,000 bone of these remains (Carden et al., 2020). Woodman et al. (1997) radiocarbon dated numerous animal bones, but new dating methods used by Carden et al. (2020) indicate a much older faunal presence. Interior extensive mapping is being continued since summer 2022 by members of the Cork Speleological Group, and they are finding new passageways and parts of the cave since Ussher's original map was drawn.</p> <p>Within these are further surface and in sediment bone finds. The surface finds of bones have been marked, recorded, and collected – e.g., bear and reindeer bones. These new bones can be dated using modern ultra filtration techniques and we have a collaboration with 14CHRONO in Queens' University Belfast, thereby receiving a reduction in costs payable towards dating. We wish to explore further the new bones and their dates, in how their locations within the newly found passageways and how they fit in the overall model of Castlepook cave. During the COVID-19 pandemic we kept our community in touch by holding ZOOM lectures.</p> <p>We rely on membership to produce our journal and have to date produced six journals since 2015. The Society are continually challenged by the increasing costs of printing and reduction in members due to the pandemic. The higher printing costs and retail price has also reduced sales of our recent journals and we are finding it difficult to sell books. Kilbrittain parish has a rich and colourful history with a castle dating back as far as 1036, where the Book of Mac Carthaigh Riabhach, recently donated to UCC, was written.</p> <p>The parish was at the centre of activity in the early twentieth century during the War of Independence with a very active Volunteer and Cumann na mBan branch. The information recorded in these journals will prove to be invaluable for future generations of Kilbrittain, as the Society are documenting important local information that will be lost unless it is recorded</p> <p>Many of our members and readers are elderly and several of those who contributed wonderful articles have unfortunately since passed away.
