




Figure (iii): Legislation and Policy Context for the Climate Action Plan ((Source: Climate Action Regional Offices)

Cork County Council – Climate Action Plan



Cork County Council - Climate Action Plan


Climate Action Plan sets a pathway for Cork County Council to actively translate national climate policy to local circumstances with the prioritisation and acceleration of evidence-based measures including to:

- Reduce its direct carbon emissions by 51% by 2030,
- Assist in the delivery of the climate neutrality objective at local and community levels; and
- Identify and support the development of a Decarbonising Zone (DZ) within the local authority area.

Themes: Direct Emissions, Citizen Engagement, Biodiversity, Economy,
Transportation, Built Environment, Solid Waste.

- ➤ Goals: The goals are set in the context of themes and establish a structured arrangement of objectives and actions within a framework of both mitigation and adaptation actions. The goals are context-specific and support tailored actions to respond to local issues.
- Overarching Objectives: The objectives support the delivery of the goals and frame the actions. The objectives are not intended to be measurable but rather they serve to generally define key areas, from which measurable climate actions are seeking to deliver upon.
- Actions: The actions are defined and measurable and are focused upon delivering the overarching objectives.

4.4.1.2.1	Create awareness about, and promote understanding of, climate change in Cork County through communications and education. Communications strategies will be tailored to particular audiences and may include: campaigns, talks, debates, online information, guidance documents, webinars, podcasts, video, radio and information disseminated through the Cork County libraries network (with 26 branches).
4.4.1.2.2	Develop links with young citizens (e.g. the Comhairle Na nÓg) to give voice to their concerns about climate change and to enhance their awareness and the actions that they can take.
4.4.1.2.3	Engage older people in climate action by working with the Age Friendly networks and the Older People's Council to ensure that awareness of climate action is raised and to promote and enhance the actions that they can take as a response to climate change.
4.4.1.2.4	Promote public engagement with climate action through arts linking in with the climate change pillar of Creative Ireland.
4.4.1.2.5	Liaise with other agencies to develop and promote Climate Community Leadership that will: - Build knowledge, confidence and capacity of community members to initiate climate action in their neighbourhoods - Build capacity of community leaders/change agents to "talk climate" in their networks - Identify and acknowledge existing community climate action 'champions/heroes' and acknowledge and amplify their campaigns

The Chair Cllr. John O'Sullivan thanked Tim Twomey for his presentation and opened the floor for any comments or questions.

Cllr. Declan Hurley thanked Tim Twomey for his informative presentation and had a query regarding decarbonising zones and how they will come to delivery within the 5 year plan will there be a cost on Cork County Council when implementing the plan and if local authorities can't implement the cost if funding is available will the government bridge the cost. Tim Twomey response to Cllr. Declan Hurley's query was that central government will be providing the funding and the decarbonising ones initiatives will change through out the county depending on projects and funding.

The Chair Cllr. John O'Sullivan had a query regarding the adaptability of the guidelines and what other bodies engaged on this Climate Action Plan . The Chair also mentioned that in Timoleague school and Tidy Towns, lease a piece of land which was used by Irish Water for an educational garden and that other areas should look into something like this. Tim Twomey responded that there has been plenty of response and engagement from the public and that public consultations are online. The Chair asked had there been direct contact from NGO's regarding the consultations which Tim Twomey responded not as of yet no but the door is open for feedback.

Phoebe Bright mentioned the importance of guidelines and what is the definition of sustainability and would that definition will be available, and Tim responded to Phoebe query that the definition will be available.

Ryan Howard thanked Tim Twomey for his presentation and suggested can the consultations be directed to communities, local development group platforms and can a separate consultation for further projects can be separate for them. Tim Twomey responded that a Community Officer will be commencing shortly and that they will have a role with working with the communities at a local level. The Chair Cllr. John O' Sullivan thanked Tim again and wished him the best of luck in the new role.
