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1. Part 1 News & Updates

1.1. Climate Action

1.1.1 Climate Action Update

Climate Action Plan

The Chief Executive's Report on Submissions Received to the <u>Cork County Council Draft Climate Action Plan 2024-2029</u> will be circulated to elected members on the 12th January next, together with Strategic Environmental Assessment and Appropriate Assessment screening reports of proposed modifications and the Draft Climate Action Plan showing proposed modifications. The elected members have up to 6 weeks to consider this Chief Executive's Report, in accordance with the requirements of the Climate (Amendment) Act 2021. Elected members must adopt the final plan within six weeks of receipt of this documentation being circulated. The Elected Members will be briefed on the 19th of January 2024 to provide an overview of the Chief Executive's Report.

Community Climate Action Programme (CCAP)

Cork County Council launched the Community Climate Action Programme (CCAP) on Wednesday 13th December 2023, and a call for applications is open for a period of 12 weeks, closing on **Wednesday 6th March 2024 at 16:00**. The CCAP is designed to provide targeted funding for community groups through a competitive application process to deliver community climate action. Eligible community organisations can apply **for up to 100% funding** across three categories: (i) small scale projects: less than €20,000, (ii) medium scale projects: €20,000 to €50,000, and (iii) large scale projects: €51,000 to €100,000. 1.2. Waste & Litter

1.2.1 Brown Bin Collection Service available to all from January 2024.

From **January 2024**, new legislation means every household with a waste collection service is entitled to a brown bin collection from their service provider.

Up until now, only approximately 69% of households in Ireland up have been able to avail of a food waste collection service from their waste service collector. Mywaste.ie is encouraging everyone who does not already have the service to contact their waste collector and request a brown bin service in 2024, because "you're never too remote to recycle!"

A brown bin service accepts all types of food including raw and cooked meat and fish, plate scrapings, along with fruit and vegetable peelings. Other items that can go into the brown bin include food-soiled paper napkins, paper towels, pizza boxes as well as grass clippings and light garden waste. There is lots of information available at

1.2.2 National End of Waste Criteria or Recycled Aggregate

The EPA published the National End of waste Criteria for Recycled Aggregates in October last. The decision applies to aggregates recycled from construction and demolition waste, including soil and stone, concrete bricks and ceramics. The criteria will allow waste to be reclassified as a product on the market.

The decision will keep materials in use for longer and help towards our circular economy and green public procurement targets by using recycled materials in road construction and general fill. The replacement of virgin aggregates with recycled aggregates will increase recycling in the construction and demolition sectors.

1.2.1 National By-Product Criteria for Site-Won Asphalt

In November last the EPA also published the National By-Product Criteria for Site-Won asphalt (e.g. road planings) which became effective immediately.

These criteria allow for the classification of road planings as a by-product, meaning it is not waste. The by-product can subsequently be used or placed on the market in the same way as virgin material. These criteria support waste prevention and facilitate the reuse of materials in new construction projects, in line with circular economy objectives.

Construction and Demolition waste accounts for over 50% of all waste in Ireland and the National decision aims to reduce waste in the road construction industry. This means that road planings are no longer considered a waste if used in accordance to the criteria. The elimination of a case-by-case assessment carried out by the EPA is welcomed as it will set a level playing field for all stakeholders and will encourage more stakeholders to participate.

1.3. Water Quality

1.3.1 New Grant Schemes for Septic Tanks in 2024.

The Minister for Housing, Local Government and Heritage, Darragh O'Brien, recently announced changes to domestic wastewater treatment systems grants, (commonly known as septic tank grants), in a press release on 4th November 2023.

The new regulations introduce the following changes;

- Increase in maximum grant payable from €5,000 to €12,000,
- The requirement to have the septic tank system registered before the 1st February 2013 has been removed,

There is no change in other eligibility criteria i.e

- The system must have been inspected by Cork County Council under the EPA's National Inspection Plan (136 inspections to be undertaken in Cork County this year)
- o **Or Be** located in a Priority Area for Action (PAA)
- o or <u>High Status Objective Catchment Areas</u>

Note, there is no grant available for works costing less than €750 in Priority Areas for Action and High-Status Areas.

It is anticipated that the next national River Basin Management Plan, the publication of which is overdue may expand the areas covered by PAAs and High-Status Objective Catchments

1.4. Air Quality

1.4.1 Protect your health this heating season.

As we are now in the midst of the heating season, we'd like to remind councillors that the national ban on the burning of smoky solid fuels including coal, wet timber and other smoky fuels has been in place for over a year.

This is primarily a public health initiative aimed at improving air quality both indoors and outside. Particulate matter emissions from solid fuel burning have a proven harmful impact on health, contributing to heart attacks and strokes as well as significantly compromising the quality of life for people suffering from respiratory conditions such as asthma.

This heating season we're asking elected members to

- To assist in promoting the clean air message,
- to encourage householders to use alternative heating systems where possible,
- and where there is no alternative to promote the use of approved solid fuels only,



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1.4.2 Sale of Non-Compliant solid fuel remains an issue.

The Environment Directorate recently undertook a county-wide market surveillance exercise alongside its regular programme of inspections of solid fuel retailers. While most retailers are compliant and sell only approved fuels, we have uncovered evidence of the sale and transport of unapproved fuels, particularly bituminous (smoky) coal. Some of the non-compliant retailers identified are in North Cork.

Although this illegal trade is confined to a small number of operators, it is damaging to compliant operators who are losing customers and revenue. The fact that much of this smoky coal is being sourced in Northern Ireland and is being transported all the way to Cork without payment of VAT or Carbon Tax allows non-compliant operators to undercut legitimate traders.

The Environment Directorate will continue to monitor closely and will initiate enforcement action as necessary, and we will also co-ordinate with Revenue & Customs services as appropriate. 1.5. Community Environmental Awareness Programmes

1.5.1 Cloth Nappy Scheme

Cork County Council are collaborating with Cork City Council, Cork University Maternity Hospital (CUMH) and Voice Ireland to support parents in making a move from disposable nappies to reusable cloth nappies.

The Cloth Nappy Incentive Scheme supports the use of reusable nappies among families who could not otherwise have considered trying them owing to the upfront costs in buying the nappies! The scheme was established by VOICE with funding provided by the Environmental Protection Agency- a very successful pilot has already been run in Dublin.

On a completely voluntary basis, a number of CUMH patients will be offered a cloth nappy starter kit worth €100. Support will also be provided to the recipients and feedback on their experience will also be gathered.

A baby uses between 4,000 and 4,500 nappies before potty training at roughly 2.5 years and the UNEP reported in 2021 that disposable nappies are one of the biggest contributors to plastic waste globally.

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1.5.2 New recycling initiative February '24.

Ireland will soon be introducing a Deposit Return Scheme.

From February 2024, when you buy a drink in a plastic bottle, aluminium or steel can that feature the Re-turn logo, you will pay a small deposit in addition to the price of the drink.

When you return your empty, undamaged container to any retail outlet, you will get your deposit back in full.

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1.6. National Broadband Plan (NBP)

1.6.1 Fibre Roll-out (BCPs)

NBI rely on their parent website at https://nbi.ie/ to provide information on the National Broadband Contract. Websites https://nbi.ie/nbp-project-progress/ provides greater detail on the roll-out progress to premises across the Intervention Areas.


The DECC update on the delivery of the National Broadband Plan - January 2023 can be accessed at https://www.gov.ie/en/press-release/15384-update-on-the-delivery-of-the-national-broadband-plan-january-2023/ and a screengrab from the NBI website at https://nbi.ie/nbp-project-progress/ identifies that fibre deployment to 205K properties will be completed by end 2023. NBI presently advise that this target will be exceeded.

Network build is substantially complete in Carrigaline, Midleton, Youghal, Rathmore, Templemartin as well as the Hare and Long Island DA's. Deployment in the Tallow,


Fermoy and Kanturk DA's is ongoing. Survey works in the Kilcrohane DA is about to commence before Christmas. Approx. 81,000 premises across Cork County will ultimately benefit from access to high-speed broadband constructed under the National Broadband Contract and it is estimated 76,000 of these premises are in the Cork County areas.

1.6.2 Broadband Connection Points

A total of 25 BCP's are now completed across the county and are operational. Remote working is being accommodated at a number of BCP's.

The Council continues to support the Broadband Connection Points (BCPs) initiative and is co-funding the monthly broadband retail service costs at BCP's in association with Dept. Rural and Community Development. Many of the BCP's availed of Town and Village funding support to purchase furniture and fittings to enhance remote working opportunities.

Centres across the county hosting BCP sites will benefit to amounts of €320K following successful applications under the Community Centre Investment Fund grant scheme aimed at upgrading and development of community centre facilities which had become aged and dilapidated over time. The successful groups are:

All projects funded under the Community Centre Investment Fund must be completed by March 2024 for drawdown of the approved funding.

Caheragh Community Hall was recently awarded €1,000 under the RISE Community Fund. The RISE Community Fund is supported by NBI and is aimed at addressing the rural digital divide. It awards grants of €1,000 each to empower local businesses, community groups and social enterprises to enhance their digital capacity. The Fund offers an immediate financial injection into the local community, boosting the digital ecosystem.

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1.7. Emergency Services

1.7.1 External Emergency Plan Test-Zenith Energy Bantry Bay Terminal Ltd

The Zenith Energy Bantry Bay terminal is located on Whiddy Island, and plays a critical role in both National and European energy storage. The terminal currently operates 1.4 million m³ storage fuel capacity, with up to 70% of storage volumes allocated to the National Oil Reserves Agency. The site is considered an Upper-Tier establishment under the COMAH Regulations which requires that its External Emergency Plans be tested every three years.

A test of the Zenith Energy Bantry Bay Terminal Ltd External Emergency Plan took place at the Westlodge Hotel in Bantry on Tuesday 3rd October 2023. The exercise tested a major accident scenario by simulating an activation of the External Emergency Plan for the site. External Emergency Plans are specific Sub-Plans of the Major Emergency Plan of each Principal Response Agency, including Cork County Council.

The event was led by Cork County Council and was well supported by the Interagency Emergency Management Office, the Principal Response Agencies, the EPA, Bantry Inshore Search and Rescue Association, the Port of Cork and Zenith Staff.










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1.7.2 Severe Weather- Organisational Emergency Response Systems

Following the receipt of Severe Weather Warnings, Cork County Council's Severe Weather Assessment Team (SWAT) convene to assess the likely level of response the situation requires based on the severity of the weather forecast and weather warnings, tidal surge warnings from the OPW, local knowledge of particular catchments and coastal areas, antecedent conditions, flood alerts from the ESB and/or information from any Flood Warning Systems in place. The situation is continuously assessed by Cork County Council throughout the duration of the severe weather alert.

Cork County Council's Crisis Management Team will be alerted in the event of the activation of the Flood Emergency Response Plan.

Inter-agency coordination will be established for severe weather events if deemed necessary. This may require the setting up of an On-Site Coordination Group (or Flood Operations Group). Off-site strategic support will be established by the Local Coordination Group in County Hall, if required.



Since the beginning of October the following groups met in response to Met Eireann Status National Orange & Red weather warnings that were issued:

- Cork County Council's SWAT convened six times
- Cork County Council's SWAT/ CMT convened seven times
- The Storm Babet On-site Coordination / Flood Operations Group convened six times
- The National Emergency Coordination Group (NECG) convened on five occasions
- The National Department for Fire & Emergency Management Crisis Management Team met on two occasions.
- Met Eireann provided four severe weather briefing.

2.2. Water

2.2.1 Public Drinking Water

2.2.2 Private Drinking Water Compliance Monitoring

Following updated HSE advise, sampling at nursing homes recommenced in 2022, subject to the incidence rate of Covid-19 at the time, as well as the agreement by management at individual nursing homes. In Q1 2023 priority was given to these nursing homes, as well as schools and creches.

Under the terms of our Service Level Agreement (SLA) with Irish Water, the Environment Directorate delivers an extensive sampling & testing programme in relation to public drinking water supplies. Summary data on progress against overall targets is given below. It is not currently possible to break this data down by Municipal District.






Figure 1: IW Work Programme-Inspections




Figure 2: IW Work Programme – Samples



2.6. Energy Management

2.6.1 SEAI

Public bodies are required under Statuary Instrument 426 of the European Union Energy Efficiency Regulations (2014) as amended to report their energy performance annually. The system by which public bodies report their energy consumption is through the Monitoring and Reporting (M&R) system, managed by the Sustainable Energy Authority of Ireland (SEAI).

Under the Climate Action Plan, Cork County Council had an energy efficiency improvement target of 50% from the baseline year of 2009 by 2030.

2.6.2 Energy Efficiency Status 2030 (preliminary)




Figure 1 Cork County Council's energy efficiency performance glide path to 2030 from SEAI M&R

At the end of 2021, Cork County Council's energy efficiency was 25.3% better than baseline. The NEEAP target glide path presented in the current SEAI monitoring and reporting scorecard is shown in Figure 1.

The figures presented were published by the SEAI in their Annual Report 2020 on Public Sector Energy Efficiency Performance. The major findings are as follows:

- 2.8% worse than 2020
- 25.3% better than baseline (2009)
- 49.4% improvement required by 2030

Cork County Council's 2021 scorecard is expected to be published by SEAI in October 2023.

2.6.5 ISO 50001

Cork County Councils Energy Management System (EnMS) is accredited to the ISO 50001 standard. Cork County Council is therefore compliant with SI 426, which is the statutory instrument that requires all large organisations to either have completed an organisational energy audit or have implemented an approved EnMS. An ISO 50001 surveillance audit was successfully completed on the 27th of April 2023.

2.6.6 Significant Energy Users (SEU)

ISO 50001 is an organisational energy management system. A requirement of the ISO 50001 accreditation is that Cork County Council continuously monitors and reports on its SEU's. Cork County Council has four nr. Significant Energy Users (SEU). Cumulatively they account for more than 80% of all energy consumption. The 2022 percentage breakdown is provided below:

- Public Lighting (30%)
- Fleet (37%)
- County Hall campus (5%)
- Leisure Centres (7%)
 - Fermoy
 - Mallow
 - Dunmanway
- Other buildings (20%)

2.6.7 Energy Efficiency Status

The Energy & Climate Change Section monitor the energy consumption of each SEU monthly using Energy Performance Indicators (EnPI). The EnPI for each Significant Energy User is described as follows:

County Hall has two EnPIs

- A formula called CUSUM predicts what energy should have been used based on past performance and is adjusted for weather conditions.
- kWh/m²/year
- Fleet
 - Is based on the average monthly litres/100km over the past 12 months.

The Swimming Pools

- A formula called CUSUM predicts what energy should have been used based on past performance and is adjusted for weather conditions.
- **Public lighting** is calculated as the average wattage per lamp in the County. This energy performance indicator (EnPI) is reviewed annually.
